KINGSLEY BEN-ADIR



Kingsley Ben-Adir is fast rising through the ranks in what has been an exciting few years so far. In 2020, Kingsley starred as civil rights leader Malcom X in Regina King's directorial debut, *One Night in Miami*. Kingsley also played the role of Barack Obama in the Showtime mini-series *The Comey Rule* and featured opposite Zoe Kravitz in Hulu's TV adaptation of *High Fidelity* amongst other notable roles. In 2021, Kingsley was nominated for a BAFTA Rising Star award after an exceptional year in film and TV. Last

year, Kingsley appeared in Greta Gerwig's *Barbie* starring Margot Robbie and Ryan Gosling. He also starred in a leading role opposite Samuel L. Jackson and Ben Mendelsohn in Marvel's *Secret Invasion* for Disney+. In February this year, Kingsley played the iconic reggae legend Bob Marley in *Bob Marley: One Love* from Paramount Pictures.

TAHIRAH GOODEN



Tahirah Gooden is a Director on the Mid-Budget Film Team at Netflix, where she heads the Emerging Filmmaker Slate, a division specializing in developing and guiding first-time directors from historically excluded/underrepresented backgrounds through the various stages of development and production.

Most recently, Tahirah oversaw the development and production of the hit Netflix original film THE MOTHER, directed by Niki Caro and starring Jennifer

Lopez. Previous films on Tahirah's slate include the critically acclaimed film TYLER PERRY'S A JAZZMAN'S BLUES, THE OLD GUARD, directed by Gina Prince-Bythewood, and DA 5 BLOODS, directed by iconic filmmaker Spike Lee.

Tahirah holds an MFA in Film Producing from USC's prestigious Peter Stark Producing Program.



PRESENTATION OF FILMS





PAULA PLACIDO

Paula Andrea Placido is an Actor and Painter of Argentine-Italian descent. She was born in Dominican Republic and at the age of six, she moved to West Palm Beach, Florida where she spent her formative years studying Visual Arts and Theater. She broke into TV by guest starring on shows

MARC EVANS

Marc Evans is a producer whose films include THE OLD GUARD starring Charlize Theron and THE MOTHER starring Jennifer Lopez both of which premiered on Netflix. Marc was formerly President of Paramount Pictures where he supervised films including the MISSION: IMPOSSIBLE and STAR TREK

franchises and other films including: A QUIET PLACE, ANNIHILATION, ARRIVAL, INTERSTELLAR, SELMA and ZODIAC. Evans served as Program Director of the Chicago International Film Festival. He is a graduate of the University of Chicago where he was Chairman of DOC Films, the nation's oldest student film group. Evans is married to Kirsten Albrecht. They have two children, Harper and Gideon.



ELLIE WEN

Ellie Wen is an award-winning filmmaker from Hong Kong and Los Angeles. She is an alumna of Film Independent's Project Involve fellowship program and SFFILM's FilmHouse Residency Program. Her films have been featured on The Guardian, The New York Times, The New Yorker, POV, Short

of the Week, SoulPancake, selected as Vimeo Staff Pick, and screened at premier festivals around the world. She is a graduate of the Documentary Film MFA Program at Stanford University and currently works as a producer at Actual Films in San Francisco.



SABRINA WASHBURN

Sabrina Jacob Washburn is a director, choreographer, playwright, performer, and educator. She is currently the theatre program director at Harvard-Westlake School in Los Angeles and held a similar position at Grace Church School in New York City for ten years. She also taught at New York

University in the Educational Theatre program and spent many years working with international students in Switzerland. Her work with students in various settings has ignited a passion for creating challenging work for emerging adults, as well as performances that span theatrical genres. ZOILA PANIAGUA

Zoila Paniagua began her career at Sony Pictures 20 years ago as a member of the Worldwide Marketing Finance team. During her tenure with Finance, she had the opportunity to move into the Marketing & Distribution team, where she provided support from ground up with film promotions, Corp Buyouts and Special

Events. The experience was both personally and professionally rewarding and it remains a career highlight for her. Throughout these experiences, she has gained knowledge of content life cycle from production til release, giving her a deep insight into an industry transformation.



ANTHONY SPARKS

Anthony Sparks, a TV showrunner and writer-producer originally from Chicago's south side, advocates for diversity in entertainment. He helmed "Queen Sugar" and has credits including "Bel-Air," "Mike," "The Blacklist," "Lincoln Heights," and "The District." Sparks has deals with Disney+, Blumhouse,

BET, HBO Max, and is developing series with Lionsgate, Legendary, Netflix, and Harpo. He's earned a Humanitas Prize nomination, NAACP Image Award, and Television Academy Honors Award, plus 4 NAACP Image Award nods for Outstanding Writing. Sparks holds a Ph.D. from USC, is a teacher and mentor, and founded The Sparks DEI Center at USC's School of Dramatic Arts with his wife Anita Dashiell-Sparks.



LIZ YALE MARSH

Liz Yale Marsh is an Emmy-winning, Grammy-nominated documentary producer currently under an overall deal with Universal Television Alternative Studio. She recently produced the feature documentary "Little Richard: I Am Everything," directed by Lisa Cortes and executive produced by Dee Rees

and Rolling Stone. The film opened the 2023 Sundance Film Festival and has been nominated for a Grammy, NAACP Image Award, GLAAD Media Award, and was included in MoMA's The Contenders film series as well as Variety's list of the top 10 films of 2023. She most recently Executive Produced the CNN Original Series "Vegas: The Story of Sin" and executive produces AMC/ Sundance true crime anthology series "It Couldn't Happen Here." Liz was formerly the Head of Documentaries & Premium Series for Bungalow Media + Entertainment, where she produced series "Surviving Jeffrey Epstein" and "The Preppy Murder," feature documentary "The Panama Papers," and the Emmy-winning NBC children's documentary series "GIVE."



CHERI GAULKE

Cheri Gaulke has been a pioneer in the feminist art movement of Los Angeles since the 1970s known for her performance art, public art commissions, and award-winning films. She is proud to have taught at Harvard-Westlake for 31 years and been part of the beginnings of Westflix. She retired from teaching in 2019 to focus on *Acting*

Like Women, a feature documentary about feminist performance art and the Woman's Building in 1970s-80s Los Angeles, which is currently in post-production.

FOUNDER'S AWARD

This prize is chosen by Liz Yale Marsh '04, a true cinephile and visionary, who imagined, planned, and produced the inaugural Westflix Film Festival as a high school senior in 2004. Now an Emmy-winning documentary film and television producer, Liz embraces film in all its possibilities. Each year she chooses a film for the Founder's Award that honors the legacy of the festival in its artistic risk taking, passion, and heart.


THE SALLY MENKE AWARD FOR EDITING

In our desire to make visible the role women play in the film industry, we celebrate the career of Sally Menke, who tragically passed away in 2010. She edited every Quentin Tarantino film and he called her his "only truly genuine collaborator." Menke is part of a grand tradition of female editors that includes Thelma Schoonmaker (RAGING BULL,) Verna Fields (JAWS,) Dede Allen (BONNIE AND CLYDE,) Dana Glauberman (JUNO,) Anne Coates (LAWRENCE OF ARABIA,) and Marie-Josèphe Yoyotte (THE 400 BLOWS,) among many others.

HUMANITARIAN AWARD

This award honors a film that improves people's lives by weaving stories and revealing truths about humanity. It inspires us to confront and reflect upon who we are and who we want to be.





THE CHERI GAULKE AWARD FOR VISUAL STORYTELLING

This accolade honors a person who, for decades, defined Visual Arts at Harvard-Westlake. A true visionary, an intersectional feminist, and a loving and generous instructor, Cheri Gaulke P'12 P'12 taught at Westlake School and then Harvard-Westlake from 1988 to 2019. She remains a highly respected and influential artist and filmmaker. This award is given to a film that captures Gaulke's love for original, quirky, brave storytelling. The winning film is recognized for its cultural impact beyond the screen and its ability to bring light to marginalized voices. The award itself employs an outsized replication of Gaulke's signature eyewear and, like the artist, is one of a kind.




TED WALCH AWARD FOR TEACHING AND MENTORSHIP

The Ted Walch award for Teaching and Mentorship honors the remarkable impact that high school teachers and community mentors of film production, video art,

and/or cinema studies have on their students. \$1,500 will be given directly to the award recipient to fund their school's film program and/or classroom equipment and facilitate a more accessible learning environment. This award honors Ted Walch, a universally beloved member of the Harvard-Westlake community with an exceptional passion for teaching and mentorship. A dedicated Westflix advisor for 19 years, Ted Walch passed away at the age of 80 in 2022.

This year's Ted Walch Award will be presented by Nick Lieberman, a filmmaker best known for co-writing and co-directing the 2023 full-of-heart mockumentary film *Theater Camp*. Nick was one of Ted's many "favorite students," and a Westflix Festival Director in 2011.




